The meeting was called to order by Mr. Nicholson, Chairman. He welcomed all present and asked if there were any public comments. Mr. Mize gave the invocation.

Daniel Esquivel, Executive Director of Hereford Campus, spoke of the February 17 open house of the Everett and Mabel McDougal Hinkson Memorial Campus in Hereford. He presented Mr. Nicholson with a framed certificate in appreciation for his part in the open house.

MINUTES APPROVED:

Dr. Woodburn moved, seconded by Ms. Nelson to approve minutes of the regular meeting of January 28, 2014. The motion carried unanimously.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION REPORT:

Claire Villanueva, representing SGA, reported that the Distinguished Lecture Series featuring Paul Rusesabagina, the hotel manager whose heroism inspired the movie, *Hotel Rwanda*, will be held on March 4 at the Globe-News Center for the Performing Arts Center and tickets are now available. The State Student Government Convention will be in Austin on April 10-13. The AC Student Government Association is running for State Vice President.

EDUCATION REPORT - CORE CURRICULUM REVISION:

Jerry Moller, Dean of Arts and Sciences, presented a PowerPoint presentation. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Undergraduate Education Advisory Committee (UEAC) made a recommendation for colleges to reconsider the Texas Core Curriculum to ensure that it reflects current and future demands on student knowledge and skills. The following was approved by THECB, "Through the core curriculum, students will gain a foundation of knowledge of human cultures and the physical and natural world; develop principles of personal and social responsibility for living in a diverse world; and advance intellectual and practical skills that are essential for all learning." There are six core objectives: 1) critical thinking skills; 2) communication skills; 3) empirical and quantitative skills; 4) teamwork; 5) social responsibility; and, 6) personal responsibility. Summary of the new core curriculum includes: 6 hours of communication; 3 hours of mathematics; s hours of life and physical sciences; 3 hours of language, philosophy & culture; 3 hours of creative arts; 6 hours of American history; 6 hours of government/political science; 3 hours of social/behavioral science; 6 hours of component area option (institutional requirement) for a total of 42 semester credit hours. Mr. Moller discussed the current core curriculum requirements for AA, AS, AAS degrees. Lifetime Fitness will not be included in the fall 2014 core curriculum. The THECB reported that in 2015 all core areas will require 60 hours. Mr. Moller shared the considered course redesign of English 1301 -Composition I.

CLINICAL MEDICAL ASSISTANT CERTIFICATE PROGRAM APPROVED:

The Clinical Medical Assistant certificate curriculum was submitted to the Curriculum Committee on Friday, January 31, 2014, and was approved unanimously after relevant questions and discussion. This new program is one that was identified via the Department of Labor Grant and is in part one of the career pathways offered to students as a result of data gathered from focus group members who work within the medical affiliates of the region and the Amarillo community.

The Board of Regents was asked to approve the Certification Form for new Associate of Applied Science Degree and Certificate Programs to be submitted to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. The Certification Form will be posted for public comment for 30 days, and if there are no objections, The Coordinating Board will automatically approve this request. The first student cohort is planned for the fall 2014 semester.

Mr. Forrester moved, seconded by Ms. Nelson to approve submission of the Clinical Medical Assistant Certification Form to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board for AC to offer the program. The motion carried unanimously.

SALE OF COUNTY PROPERTY OBTAINED THROUGH SHERIFF'S SALE ACCEPTED:

Properties foreclosed for taxes and sold at a "Sheriff's Sale" must sell for a minimum bid which is the lower of the adjusted value or the taxes due plus costs of the sale. In some cases this puts the price above what people will pay at a "Sheriff's Sale." Those properties which do not sell are then held in trust by the county/school tax office. The law provides that they can be offered for sale by sealed bids or auction without a minimum bid at a later date. A listing of those properties is below and additional information is attached at pages 178 through 180. Board approval is required because the properties are held in trust by Randall County.

AC has been approached by the City assistant park superintendent and a Highland Park employee to determine if it is possible to donate land in the east housing area to the city for use as a recreational park. Mark White, legal counsel, determined it can be done. Another option could be to enter into an agreement for the City to maintain the park. The City will conduct a formal study of the proposal. This was a discussion item only, but the Board did agree to move forward with seeking a proposal from the City.

It was recommended to award Proposal No. 1295 to Parsley's Roofing, the <u>low proposer to the specifications</u> for the amount of \$108,335.00.

Funds for the project are available in the 2013-2014 A & I Budget.

Ms. Nelson moved, seconded by Ms. Fortunato to approve the Consent Agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

FURNITURE & EQUIPMENT PURCHASE FOR THE FIRST FLOOR OF THE COLLEGE UNION BUILDING, WASHINGTON STREET CAMPUS APPROVED:

New furniture is needed to equip the newly renovated first floor of the College Union Building. This price includes furniture for the new "Living Room," offices, workrooms, and other miscellaneous areas.

The top two vendors identified are Hon and National.

Hon furniture is available through an Interlocal Agreement with the City of Amarillo (BPA/TXMAS 6-71-111060). National furniture is available through TXMAS Contract #11-71050.

The estimated cost is not to exceed \$65,000.00.

Funds are available in the 2007 Bond Project and the Student Affairs 2014 Budget.

Mr. Hicks moved, seconded by Mr. Forrester to approve the vendor for the furniture purchase for the first floor of the College Union Building. The motion carried unanimously.

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FURNITURE & EQUIPMENT PURCHASE FOR THE NEWLY RENOVATED DUTTON HALL, WASHINGTON STREET CAMPUS APPROVED:

New furniture is needed to equip the newly renovated Dutton Hall. This price includes furniture for offices, classrooms, "sticky spaces," workrooms, conference rooms, file/storage rooms and other miscellaneous areas.

The top three vendors identified are Hon, National, and Virco.

Hon furniture is available through an Interlocal Agreement with the City of Amarillo (BPA/TXMAS 6-71-111060). Virco furniture is available through U.S. Communities Contract. National furniture is available through TXMAS Contract #11-71050.

The estimated cost is not to exceed \$165,000.00.

Funds are available in the 2007 Bond Project.

Mr. Hicks moved, seconded by Mr. Mize to approve the vendor for the furniture purchase for Dutton Hall. The motion carried unanimously.

FINANCIAL REPORT ACCEPTED:

The financial statements as of January 31, 2014 are attached at pages 183 through 192.

Revenue

We have received 54% of revenue budgeted or \$32.2 million of the \$59.3 million budgeted.

Expenditures

We are 42% of the way through the year. We have spent 33% of the amount budgeted.

Auxiliary Enterprises

The bookstores' profits total \$376,000. Rental properties' net profit is \$307,000. It is higher than this time last year. Employees have used \$123,000 in employee scholarships.

Restricted Funds

Federal grants and contracts have decreased \$1,267,457; state grants and contracts have decreased \$186,299; local grants and contracts have increased \$463,068; and KACV grants and contracts have increased \$150,846.

Cash and Investments

\$56.8 million total minus \$4.5 million (bond) = \$52.3 million – January 2014; \$64.9 million total minus \$14.2 million (bond) = \$50.7 million – January 2013; \$53.8 million total minus \$11.8 million (bond) = \$42.0 million – January 2012.

Alterations & Improvements

\$760,338 has been spent out of total A&I/Land Improvements without branch campuses included. There is \$2.1 million budgeted. The Moore County and Hereford Campuses have spent \$1.8 million out of \$2.4 million budgeted.

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FINANCIAL REPORT ACCEPTED Continued:

Tax Schedule

\$15.0 million has been collected out of \$20.6 million budgeted leaving \$5.6 million to collect.

Bond Expenditures

There has been \$64.7 million on Amarillo projects spent out of \$67.8 million budgeted. The Moore County Campus projects are 100% complete.

Mr. Hicks moved, seconded by Ms. Fortunato to accept the January 2014 financial reports. The motion carried unanimously.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

The Hinkson Memorial Campus grand opening was held on February 16. There were 250 people who were in attendance.

Dr. Matney referred to the three articles which were attached as pdf documents to his preview email; included was an article about required statewide core curriculum changes, a story detailing the life and many contributions of Prenis Williams, and an AC College Relations news release concerning the dedication of the Helen Gerald Memorial Suzuki Library on February 28.

President's Cabinet had a retreat on February 14 to discuss growing enrollment. Twenty-eight of the fifty Texas community colleges have had enrollment decreases. Dr. Matney spoke of some of the discussion and decisions made throughout the retreat.

An internal Energy Management Plan was developed; the Request for Proposal (RFP) on Energy Cost Savings was sent out to fifteen vendors; the deadline for submission is March 7.

The Student Money Management Center offers Financial Fitness Workshops, classroom and student organization presentations, and individual sessions. A handout was distributed.

A team from Midland College recently visited Amarillo College to learn and share ideas about AC's Student Success Initiatives.

Dr. Matney praised the *Plugged-In* Winter 2014 issue.

The Amarillo Area Adult Literacy Council Agreement is working well; an executive director has not been hired.

Thumpers Grill at Eastport is now open for business.

There are now 127 students and 80 coaches participating in the Champions and Coaches Program. Trena Rider is actively recruiting additional coaches.

The Distinguished Lecture Series will be held on March 4 at the Globe News Center for Performing Arts; the reception will be at 5:30 p.m.; the lecture will be at 7:00 p.m.

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT Continued:

The Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy Graduation will be on March 6, 6:30 p.m., at the Oasis Baptist Church.

Dr. Matney encouraged regents to contribute to Junior and Community College Political Action Committee (JACC-PAC). The Texas community colleges goal is \$100,000 and the goal for Amarillo College is \$1,730.

REGENTS' REPORTS, COMMITTEES, AND COMMENTS REGARDING AC AFFILIATES:

Chairman, Nicholson stated that two of the Board committees could be disbanded due to their mission being completed: Hereford Campus Expansion Committee and Moore County Campus Facilities Development Committee.

The Panhandle PBS pledge drive will be beginning soon.

Panhandle PBS will host a screening of *One Square Mile Texas: Silverton* on Thursday, February 27; this program will highlight the small Panhandle town of Silverton, its history, citizens, and culture.

Ms. Fortunato distributed a brochure of the Achievement in Art, The Fred and Laura Ruth Bidwell Collection of Photography exhibit at the Amarillo Museum of Art; the exhibit will be featured through March 23, 2014.

A card was distributed regarding the AMoA youth art programs.

Ms. Fortunato who chairs the East Property Family Housing Ad Hoc Committee reported that an RFP was issued on January 14 and closed on February 4 which resulted in no proposals being received. The subcommittee recommended increasing rent for the East Campus family housing.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
