The meeting was called to order by Mr. Nicholson, Chairman. He welcomed all present and asked if there were any public comments. Mr. Nicholson gave the invocation.

SPECIAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD PRESENTATIONS:

Dr. Matney presented a special achievement award to Kim Davis, Dean of Continuing Education. He thanked her for all the hard work she does for Amarillo College. MINUTES APPROVED:

Dr. Proffer moved, seconded by Mr. Forrester to approve minutes of the regular meeting of April 22, 2014. The motion carried unanimously.

TOUR OF CAREER/TECHNICAL CENTER

EDUCATION REPORT – MOORE COUNTY CAMPUS UPDATE:

Mrs. Bates reported that 49% of the 2013 Dumas High School graduates attended Amarillo College; 101 attend at the Moore County Campus. She turned the program over to MCC students. Adam Aguayo, MCC SGA President, spoke of attending the State and regional conferences. MCC students are involved with intramural sports. Pedro Hernandez spoke of various student organizations which included Lion's Club and Student Government. Jose Alvarado told of the P.E.A.C.E. Bible Club where students are challenged to perform random acts of kindness; approximately 15-20 students attend. Nolan White who is a peer leader led groups in team building at Ceta Canyon and is a Writer's Corner tutor. Students help at Badger Boot Camp. Abby Gonzales was awarded the MCC Outstanding Student; she is also a Phi Theta Kappa member; and she was a QUEST student in high school. Sonya Madrigal was also a QUEST student and recently received the AC Student Employee of the Year award. Mariela Trejo was a QUEST student and is a nursing student. Other students introduced include Saul Garay and Fabian Hermosillo. Ms. Arias spoke of working with high school students and offering Career Fairs. Mrs. Maples told of the SSS grant. Mrs. Bates and students applauded Dr. Matney for his accomplishments while at Amarillo College.

MASS MEDIA REVISED CURRICULUM:

Mrs. Green and Mrs. Gibson provided a brief report on the revised AC Mass Media curriculum. Mrs. Green spoke of the redesigned mass media program. Mrs. Gibson said they are working on ways for students to get in and out of the program quicker. The radio-TV and mass communication classes integrate technology and social media. There are many job opportunities at television stations and Disney for AC mass communication students. Mrs. Gibson said the professors work to prepare their students with skills for entry level jobs. They want mass communication students to be able to tell the AC story. Along with the redesign, it was proposed to rename the program the Matney Mass Media Program. Dr. Matney spearheaded the revision of the former mass communication, radio/TV, and journalism program. In conjunction with the renaming of the program, the AC Foundation has established a Paul Matney Fund which will assist the Matney Mass Media Program and other AC initiatives and will be used for scholarships, faculty support, and program needs with the College. The Board was unanimous in their support of the new name of the program.

RECORDS MANAGEMENT ANNUAL REPORT:

Title 6, subtitle C, Local Government Code provides that a junior college district must establish by resolution an active and continuing records management program to be administered by a records management officer. The records retention administrator schedules and administers rules issued by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission; determines if the records management program and the Amarillo Junior College's District's records control schedules are **RECORDS MANAGEMENT ANNUAL REPORT Continued:**

in compliance with state regulations. The commission reports that Amarillo College is in compliance.

The Records Management Officer, Vickie Shelton, reported per Amarillo College's records management policy the annual disposition of paper records totaling 458 cases, equaling approximately 476 cubic feet, was destroyed in November 2013. The disposition of these documents was approved by the Records Management Committee per Amarillo College Policy.

ADDITION TO BOARD POLICY FOR GRANT DEVELOPMENT AND ADMINISTRATION AND MODIFICATION TO SECTION CGD APPROVED:

The following proposed policy fulfills the requirement set forth in the corrective action established as the result of findings associated with the 2013 audit.

Section H - GRANT DEVELOPMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

The purpose of grant funds is to fulfill the College's strategic directions. Once a grant award has been received, the institutional priority is to follow the grant requirements, both fiscal and programmatic, and appropriately document grant activities and expenditures. All College employees involved with any grant development or any grant administration (compliance, management and accounting) shall follow the college's centralized process for grant development or grant administration.

Also, the following revisions are proposed to the Use of Tobacco Policy contained in the Board Policy Manual, Safety Program, Section CGD.

The use of tobacco products is not permitted inside any College building.

Smoking or other use of tobacco products (including, but not limited to, cigarettes, electronic cigarettes, pipes, cigars, snuff, or chewing tobacco) is prohibited in any College building. In addition, smoking is not allowed within 20 feet of any building entrance.

Dr. Woodburn moved, seconded by Mr. Hicks to approve the addition to board policy for grant development and administration and the revisions to Section CGD. The motion carried unanimously.

CONTINUING EDUCATION TUITION INCREASE APPROVED:

Ms. Fortunato moved, seconded by Mr. Hicks to approve the Continuing Education tuition increase. The motion carried unanimously.

TAX ABATEMENT AGREEMENT WITH COCA-COLA REFRESHMENTS USA, INC. APPROVED:

This item was placed on the agenda to allow the Board to consider joining in a Tax Abatement Agreement between Coca-Cola Refreshments USA, Inc., the City of Amarillo, and the Amarillo Economic Development Corporation, including signing a Resolution and Participation Agreement authorizing such abatement. A memo from Brian Jennings, Vice President of Business Development, Amarillo EDC, is attached at page 263. A Resolution and Participation Agreement is attached at pages 264 through 266.

Mr. Jennings said that the Amarillo Economic Development Corporation is working with Coca-Cola Refreshments on the relocation of its existing downtown facility to a new facility in Amarillo CenterPort Business Park. The existing downtown property will become City-owned and will be the proposed site for the Multi-Purpose Event Venue. AEDC has entered into an agreement with Coca-Cola and the City of Amarillo to construct a new building for Coca-Cola and relocate them. Coca-Cola currently pays AC \$4,004 per year on the real property at their current location; they will continue to pay the same taxes in their new location; the request is to abate \$14,929 per year over a ten-year period. Also, Coca-Cola currently pays AC \$10,166 per year on the business personal property located in AC's taxing jurisdiction; they will continue to pay the same, but requests an abatement of \$9,784 over the ten-year period. Coca-Cola will continue to pay the tax revenue they have received in 2013 and will only receive abatement on the increased value of the real and business personal property. Ms. Casso, a Coca-Cola representative from San Antonio gave the history of Coca-Cola and said that they have served Amarillo since 1906. Mr. Whitehead, an Amarillo Coca-Cola manager, reminded regents of the good partnership of Coca-Cola in the community.

Mr. Hicks moved, seconded by Dr. Proffer to approve this Resolution and Participation Tax Abatement Agreement. The motion carried unanimously.

Bio: Nancy Forrest has been a part-time instructor in development reading at Amarillo College since 1992, while also serving as a full-time faculty member at Arbor Christian Academy and for the last 2 years at St. Andrews Episcopal School. Ms. Forrest earned a Bachelor of Arts in Elementary Education from Eastern New Mexico University and a Master's in Education from West Texas A&M University.

Ms. Fortunato moved, seconded by Dr. Proffer to approve the Consent Agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

ELLUCIAN CUSTOM PROGRAMMING IN SUPPORT OF STUDENT SUCCESS INITIATIVES APPROVED:

Amarillo College requires a one-time custom programming development effort for the creation of software that allows for the periodic transference of Blackboard Learn summarized student grade information to the Ellucian student records gradebook on a weekly or as needed basis. This programming effort will be funded by Title V funds to enhance existing Retention Alerts and

supervisory management processes. A total of 300 hours of programming support is projected for this initiative at a negotiated cost of approximately \$67,500. This initiative is a sole source acquisition as it pertains to proprietary software, algorithms and logic controlled by Ellucian, Inc. The custom software development effort will be overseen by Amarillo College Department of Information Technology Services.

<u>A sole source award, and increase to the existing annual Ellucian Colleague Enhanced and Support Agreement</u> (ESSA) contract to <u>Ellucian, Inc.</u>, dated September 2013 was recommended.

Funds are available from the Title V Grant.

This request directly applies to Goal 4: Ensure the College's Future, and more specifically, strategy 4.1: Connect planning and budgeting; and strategy 4.6: Commit the College to technology which attracts and retains students and enables effective and efficient College operations, from the Amarillo College Strategic Plan through 2015.

Ms. Fortunato moved, seconded by Mr. Forrester to approve the Ellucian custom programming in support of student success initiatives. The motion carried unanimously.

FINAL PAYMENT – BYRD BUSINESS/PARCELLS HALL, SECOND THROUGH FOURTH FLOORS, WASHINGTON STREET CAMPUS APPROVED:

Approval for final payment, in the amount of a \$6,344.65 for the project listed above was requested. Construction Manager-at-Risk, Page & Associates, Inc., provided a Guaranteed Maximum Price of \$12,253,138.00. The final cost for the project is \$12,218,510.71. A savings in the amount of \$34,627.29 has been credited back to Amarillo College.

Mr. Hicks moved, seconded by Ms. Fortunato to approve final payment for Byrd Business/Parcells Hall, second through fourth floors. The motion carried unanimously.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL NO. 1300 – RENOVATION OF FIRST FLOOR OF THE ENGINEERING BUILDING FOR AMARILLO COLLEGE, WASHINGTON STREET CAMPUS APPROVED:

RFP No. 1300, for the renovation of the first floor of the Engineering Building to create additional lab spaces for the engineering students. Proposal Package includes general construction, including demolition, some HVAC work, electrical, and other miscellaneous parts of the project. This is the second and final phase of this project.

Project was advertised in the newspaper for sub-contractors and suppliers, by Page & Associates, Inc., Construction Manager-at-Risk (CMR).

Page & Associates, Inc., provides a guaranteed maximum price of \$1,105,817.

Funds are available in the HSI STEM grant budget (\$859,294) and the A&I Budget (\$246,523).

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REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL NO. 1300 – RENOVATION OF FIRST FLOOR OF THE ENGINEERING BUILDING FOR AMARILLO COLLEGE, WASHINGTON STREET CAMPUS APPROVED Continued:

Dr. Woodburn moved, seconded by Ms. Nelson to approve the renovation of the first floor of the Engineering Building. The motion carried unanimously.

ROOM NAMING OPPORTUNITIES ON AC DOWNTOWN CAMPUS AND WASHINGTON STREET CAMPUS ACCEPTED:

Dr. Matney presented two room naming opportunities with background and details. He proposed naming the Downtown Campus auditorium the Bud Joyner Auditorium after Dr. Bud Joyner who served as AC president from 1992-1999 and as interim president 2002-2003. Dr. Joyner led the 1994 bond issue effort which renovated the old Amarillo High School gymnasium into the current Downtown Campus which houses the Continuing Education Division. The second renaming room request was the newly-remodeled Private Dining Room on the first floor of the College Union Building on the Washington Street Campus to be named the Louise Daniel Room after Louise Daniel who graduated from Amarillo College in 1951; she was elected to the AC Board of Regents in 1996 and in 2002 where she served as Board Chair until her resignation due to illness and eventual death.

Ms. Fortunato moved, seconded by Dr. Woodburn to accept naming the AC Downtown Campus Auditorium the Bud Joyner Auditorium and the Private Dining Room on the first floor of the CUB on the Washington Street Campus the Louise Daniel Room. The motion carried unanimously.

CONTRACT WITH CENERGISTIC: THE ENERGY CONSERVATION COMPANY APPROVED:

Regents received additional material from Cenergistic which included adding the Moore County Campus in Dumas and the Hinkson Memorial Campus in Hereford to the energy cost savings proposal. Gary Clark, Regional President for Cenergistic in Dallas, was present to answer questions regarding the Cenergistic energy and utility cost savings proposal and contract. If the contract is approved, AC will be hiring an energy specialist to keep track of buildings and campuses and energy savings.

Mr. Hicks moved, seconded by Ms. Fortunato to approve the contract with Cenergistic. Mr. Forrester opposed. The motion carried.

FINANCIAL REPORT ACCEPTED:

The financial statements as of April 30, 2014 are attached at pages 268 through 277.

<u>Revenue</u>

We are 2/3 through the year. 72% of the \$59.9 million budgeted has been received. To-date AC has sold PRANA 57-1/2 acres for a net of \$569,000.

Expenditures

We have spent 54% (\$32.5 million) of \$59.9 million budgeted.

FINANCIAL REPORT ACCEPTED Continued:

Auxiliary Enterprises

The bookstores' profits total \$290,279. Rental properties' net profit is \$729,544. It is higher than this time last year. Employees have used \$128,707 in employee scholarships.

Restricted Funds

Federal grants and contracts have decreased \$516,730; state grants and contracts have decreased \$113,527; local grants and contracts have increased \$422,858; and KACV grants and contracts have increased \$128,998.

Cash and Investments

\$50.0 million total minus \$2.9 million (bond) = \$47.1 million – April 2014; \$56.4 million total minus \$11.0 million (bond) = \$45.4 million – April 2013; \$52.6 million total minus \$8.1 million (bond) = \$44.5 million – April 2012.

Alterations & Improvements

\$1,005,717 has been spent out of total A&I/Land Improvements without branch campuses included. There is \$2.1 million budgeted. The Moore County and Hereford Campuses have spent \$1.9 million out of \$2.5 million budgeted.

Tax Schedule \$20,556,345 has been collected out of \$20,556,126 budgeted with a \$219 overage.

Bond Expenditures There has been \$66.0 million on Amarillo projects spent out of \$68.0 million budgeted.

Amarillo College has re-earned an AA+ credit rating.

Mr. Hicks moved, seconded by Dr. Woodburn to accept the April 2014 financial reports. The motion carried unanimously.

2015 PRELIMINARY BUDGET OVERVIEW:

Dr. Matney and Mr. Berg presented the 2015 preliminary budget overview. This presentation will allow the regents advance information and preparation for the budget and planning workshop to be held at a later date. President's Cabinet discussion of budget priorities began in fall 2013 based on student success and completion agenda. 2014-2015 budget assumptions include the #1 critical institutional priority of student success and completion, a revenue challenge based on declining enrollment, no "credit" tuition and fee increase requested, a modest tax valuation increase in district (1.8%), realignment of positions, use of reserves for A&I, a revenue increase due to LMS fee equity issue; set aside for Technology Replacement Equipment fund, additional strategic revenue increases, and energy cost savings. Budget uncertainties include tax valuations certified by PRAD in July and health insurance increase to be announced in July.

Projected total revenue and expenditures are both at \$60,426,933. No raises are projected. State appropriations are expected to decrease by \$12,527.

No action was taken.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

Dr. Matney and Dr. Pat O'Brien signed a memorandum of understanding on May 8 which reaffirms and updates our "Destination WT" agreement between Amarillo College and WTAMU.

Recently AC was the recipient of a grand piano from a local philanthropist.

Two AC student accolades include Perla Arellano, former editor of *The Ranger*, will transfer to the University of Texas in the fall; and Nicholas Levy, a music major, will attend the University of Maryland.

An FM-90, 100,000-watt radio station, transmission line burned up recently; it will cost approximately \$119,000 to replace.

Dr. Matney spoke of the Senior Center Study Committee which he told regents about at the April Board meeting; the committee which includes Dr. Matney, Mayor Harpole, Judy Day, Clay Stribling, Gary Pitner, Dr. Bud Joyner has been charged to take a fresh look at more efficient ways to meet the needs of greater numbers of seniors in our community through senior centers. The planning group's work will be completed by years' end.

Dr. Matney and Regent Chair, Don Nicholson, will attend the CCATT meeting in San Antonio in June.

The Philanthropy for the Future Planning Team has been named; Mark White is the chair; others serving on the committee include Johnny Mize, Paul Matney, Kathy Dowdy, Jill Gibson, Teresa Clemons, and Paul Clark. The committee is working on a plan for hiring a full-time development officer. The committee has met once; Mr. White will be scheduling a second meeting soon.

The Board Budget Workshop was scheduled for Tuesday, June 17, 4:00 p.m.

REGENTS' REPORTS, COMMITTEES, AND COMMENTS REGARDING AC AFFILIATES:

AC Foundation will host the Badger Bash Block Party on August 23 to raise funds for scholarships.

The current AMoA exhibition is the *Side by Side* exhibition; it is an opportunity to see two artists working with similar materials and processes; the exhibition runs through August 17. *The Work of Mary Mito* will be exhibited June 6 – August 17.

A new series on PBS is *BBQ with Franklin*, featuring Aaron Franklin.

Dr. Proffer, who chairs the Presidential Search Committee, said the committee has met; thus far, there have been 20 applicants. The deadline to submit an application is June 16. Dr. Matney's official last day is August 1.

A retirement reception for Dr. Matney will be on July 1, 5:00 – 7:00 p.m.

Chairman Nicholson reported that he received a letter of resignation from Regent Hicks due to his move from the City; his resignation is effective May 21, 2014.

BOARD NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT:

Mr. Nicholson named the following regents to serve on the Nominating Committee: Mr. Mize, Dr. Woodburn, and Mr. Forrester. Dr. Woodburn presented the following 2014-2015 officers: Mr. Donald Nicholson, Chairman; Dr. Paul Proffer, Vice Chairman; and Ms. Mary Jane Nelson, Secretary. The slate was accepted; officers will remain the same as last year.

The Amarillo Economic Development Corporation (Amarillo EDC) continues to work with Atlanta-based Coca-Cola Refreshments on the relocation of its existing downtown facility to a new facility in Amarillo CenterPort Business Park (CenterPort). CenterPort is located at the intersection of State Loop 335/Lakeside Drive and Northeast 24th Street. The existing downtown property will become City-owned and will be the ultimate site for the Multi-Purpose Event Venue (MPEV). The MPEV is one of three core projects vital to the success of the downtown redevelopment plan. The other two core projects include a convention hotel and a stand-alone parking structure.

The Amarillo EDC has entered into an agreement with Coca-Cola and the City of Amarillo to construct a new building for Coca-Cola and relocate the company out of downtown Amarillo. The agreement allows for a 90-day due diligence period. This due diligence period expires on June 27, 2014. During the due diligence period, Coca-Cola has requested the Amarillo EDC assist in securing tax abatement on the ad valorem taxes on the new project to offset the increase in operating expenses associated with a higher value asset.

The Amarillo EDC and Coca-Cola are in the process of securing tax abatement from all eligible taxing jurisdictions. On May 13, 2014, the Amarillo City Council unanimously approved a ten-year, 100-percent per year abatement on the eligible real and business personal property. The tax abatement agreement approved by the City only allows for the taxes to be abated on the incremental increase of the new project. Therefore, Coca-Cola will continue paying the taxes it has always paid on its existing facilities and business personal property, and the tax abatement shall only apply to the value above and beyond what is currently on the tax rolls. A detailed summary of this arrangement as it relates to Amarillo College is as follows:

Coca-Cola currently pays to Amarillo College \$4,004 per year on the real property located in downtown Amarillo. Coca-Cola will continue to pay the same \$4,004 every year during the term of the ten-year abatement period. Provided this request is approved by the Amarillo College Board of Regents, Coca-Cola would receive an abatement of \$14,929 per year over the same ten-year abatement period, which is only the tax that would normally be assessed on the increased value of the real property of the new project.

Similarly, Coca-Cola currently pays to Amarillo College \$10,166 per year on the business personal property located in Amarillo College's taxing jurisdiction. Coca-Cola will continue to pay the same \$10,166 every year during the term of the ten-year abatement period. Provided this request is approved by the Amarillo College Board of Regents, Coca-Cola would receive an abatement of \$9,784 per year over the same ten-year abatement period, which is only the tax that would normally be assessed on the increased value of the business personal property of the new project.

In summary, Coca-Cola will continue to provide the taxing jurisdictions with the same tax revenue they have received in 2013 and will only receive abatement on the increased value of the real and business personal property.

> That Amarillo Junior College District hereby officially elects to participate in and be bound by terms of the Abatement Agreement insofar as it applies to Amarillo College taxes and to execute this Participation Agreement for the purposes and on the conditions outlined in said agreements; and

> 2. That Don L. Nicholson, Chairman, Amarillo Junior College District Board of Regents be, and is hereby authorized and directed to execute this Participation Agreement and to do anything else necessary or appropriate to indicate the District's election to participate in the Abatement Agreement.

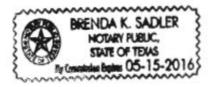
