STATUS UPDATE

The Status Update Meeting began at 6:52 p.m.

REGENTS' REPORTS, COMMITTEES AND COMMENTS REGARDING AC AFFILIATES:

- Executive Committee report by Fortunato, Proffer, Henke No report.
- Finance Committee (AC Investment, Potential Lease & Sales Opportunities, East Property Family Housing) – report by Barrett, Henke, Proffer, Mize No report.

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• AC Foundation – report by Woodburn, Henke, Barrett

Mr. Barrett reported that the committee met at the East Campus and enjoyed a good tour. Mark White outlined for them some of the future plans for the East Campus.

- Amarillo Museum of Art (AMoA) report by Fortunato
 - Ms. Fortunato reported on the new exhibit *Side by Side: Larry Bell and Gabriel Dawe* which opens July 15 and runs through October 16. A reception with the artists will be held on August 19. 2016.
- Panhandle PBS report by Nossaman, Miller

The committee's last meeting was on May 31st and they heard from AC student David Lovejoy who attributes his success to Panhandle PBS. He stated that coming to AC made his life livable again. They also heard from Mike Fuller who has finished up the Yellow City events. Upcoming events include Urban Mania, a student produced show, more from Live Here, and the August pledge drive.

- Standing Policies & Procedures Committee report by Carlisle, Fortunato, Woodburn Ms. Carlisle provided recommended modifications for Section A of the Board Policies and Procedures. Mr. White suggested that both the election dates and established dates for the Moore County and Hereford Campuses be noted under the heading <u>Current College District Boundaries</u>(Section AC). Additional language is added to the paragraph for <u>Service Area</u> to clarify campus locations. The <u>Mission</u> and <u>Values</u>, <u>Vision</u>, and <u>Goals</u> sections (Section AD) will be updated with AC's current mission statement, values, visions, and goals. No action will be taken on the information provided at this meeting but will be an agenda item at the August 30, 2016 Regular Meeting for Board approval. Any questions before that time may be directed to Ms. Carlisle.
- Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone (TIRZ) report by Woodburn No report.
- Amarillo Foundation for Education and Business report by Proffer, Mize, Carlisle No report.
- Legislative Affairs Committee Carlisle, Miller, Nossaman

Dr. Lowery-Hart has provided legislative recommendations to this committee, but they have not yet met to review those. A meeting will be set soon. At the end of September members of the legislature will be in Amarillo. Ms. Carlisle will be in contact with them to see if AC can be a part of these discussions. Dr. Lowery-Hart noted that he will be attending the TACC Summer Conference July 7-9, 2016 and that most of that agenda centers around the legislative recommendations. He recommended adding Mr. Barrett to this committee because of his involvement with the Community College Association of Texas Trustees (CCATT). Mr. Barrett agreed and stated that the focus of the last CCATT meeting he attended was funding.

• Nominating Committee – Nossaman, Proffer, Barrett No report.

Ms. Fortunato noted that committee assignments may need to be reviewed and reassigned with the addition of new Board members.

FINANCIALS

Additional information requested by the Regents at the Budget Workshop was provided.

Breakdown of miscellaneous income

Mr. Smith provided a more detailed analysis which includes income from bankcard rebates, child care revenue, dental clinic revenue, police tickets, testing fees, and smaller miscellaneous items. He noted the large amounts reflected in 2013 and 2014 were due to insurance proceeds from a hail claim.

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Cost of retiree benefits/health Insurance

Mr. Smith provided information on costs of health insurance from 2012 through 2015 breaking out current employees and retirees. The State reimburses 50% of the cost of eligible plans, but not all plans are eligible for State reimbursement resulting in a net reimbursement from the State at about 42%. Employees who meet the rule of 80 and have 10 years of service are eligible for insurance for life at no cost. The State reimburses 50% of this cost to the institution. The spouse of an employee who meets the rule of 80 with 20 years of service is also eligible for insurance but must pay the unreimbursed 50% of the premium. Mr. Smith projected maximum costs to the institution through 2025 based on the current employees and their retirement dates. The 2016-2017 budget provides for the employees who will be retiring through this year. It is difficult to do an analysis of which plans currently funded by AC as the invoice from the State per month only lists an amount owed TRS. Between now and the August Board meeting Mr. Smith will attempt to get further breakdowns, what the state requirements are, and what our options might be.

Salary increase analysis

Mr. Smith provided a graph comparing the Consumer Price Index, Social Security Cost of Living Adjustments and Amarillo College increases. The CPI is going up faster than AC's raise percentages. Social Security is about the same.

Lyndy Forrester and Cara Crowly reviewed salary comparisons with other community colleges using data from TACC, TCCTA, and the College and University Professional Association for Human Resources (CUPA). They picked a few salaries getting as close as possible to AC faculty/staff positions and compared without calculating in the proposed 3% raise. CUPA is very inclusive, by region, but is difficult to compare because it includes universities. It was noted that AC's faculty are paid more or less than their counterparts based on the discipline they teach. AC treats faculty the same across the board without differentiation based on their subject whereas other institutions vary those salaries. A more thorough analysis and breakdown on the faculty side will need to be looked at. There is a need to look at cohort data based on size and/or location of school and include WTAMU in the comparisons. AC's goal should be increases that allow the school be more competitive. A three percent raise is a step in the right direction but won't completely solve equity problems.

Facilities and Equipment Replacement Strategic Plan

Because of the newness of the campus at Hereford, the 10-year does not include that campus. Mr. Smith and Mr. Cotgreave discussed the 20-year plan which does include Hereford. They noted that this plan is for an extended period of time and projects may move around to balance work load and timelines may be adjusted according to life-cycles of items.

ENROLLMENT UPDATE

- Mr. Austin reported that there are 55 days until the Fall semester begins. As of this morning enrollment was down just .15% (7 students) and that the gap has been closed.
- On June 16th an express enrollment event was held in the Ware Student Commons. 80 potential students attended, 30 applications were received, and 10 students registered for classes. This event will be planned again next year. At the same time that evening, 80 students attended a "hands-on" financial aid event. There are more financial aid applications than in the past. This means students may be packaged before the semester begins and will be ready to pay their tuition and fees and pick up their books before classes begin.
- Six hundred letters have been sent to parents of dual credit students who are not enrolled encouraging them to consider Amarillo College.
- AC has reached out to Hastings and Anderson Merchandisers offering to work with employees who may be losing jobs due to layoffs; Excel Energy has invited AC to their call center on

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June 29th to work with their employees who might want to take courses and move on in their careers.

- On July 7th, staff from AC will travel to Hereford for an onsite registration event. Students from Bovina, Friona, and Dimmitt are also included in this event. Phone calls will be made and post cards sent out to the large number of students from Hereford who have completed applications.
- AC staff will be contacting students who were enrolled in Spring but are not yet registered for Fall inviting them to schedule an appointment with an advisor.
- The Business Office is working with some vendors and considering some improved payment plans for students that could help with enrollments. These plans might involve smaller payments, longer payouts, monthly payment options, and automatic deductions.
- Mr. Austin stated that he expects Fall enrollment to be up.

Ms. Carlisle stated that Linda Duong related to her that Caprock students are feeling more confident about coming to AC because of all the hands-on events AC has been having at that campus. Linda is an AC student who was recently honored by Leadership Texas.

NO EXCUSES 2020

Dr. Lowery-Hart informed the Regents that the college is working with Texas Tech on a grant submission that will expand existing curriculum, develop new curriculum in STEM, and will include the development of an instructional greenhouse. If funded, implementing this may require partial use of one of the AC parking lots.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

No discussion.

The Status Update Meeting ended at 6:50 p.m.

REGULAR AMARILLO COLLEGE BOARD OF REGENTS MEETING

The meeting was called to order by Ms. Fortunato, Chairman, at 7:02 p.m. She welcomed all present and asked for any public comments.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Mr. Edmond Johnston expressed his disappointment that he had not received a response to a letter he had written to AC administration. Because this item was not on the agenda, the regents made no response.

Mr. John Gutierrez asked to discuss the Physical Education courses which are no longer offered. As this item was not on the agenda no discussion could take place, but Dr. Lowery-Hart offered to meet with him after the meeting to answer his questions.

MINUTES APPROVED:

Ms. Carlisle moved, seconded by Mr. Miller to approve the minutes of the regular meeting of May 17, 2016, the special meeting of June 2, 2016, and the special meeting of June 18, 2016. The motion carried unanimously.

B. BUDGET AMENDMENTS:

The budget amendments for approval by the Board are attached at page 217.

Dr. Proffer moved, seconded by Ms. Carlisle, to approve the Consent Agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

POLICY FOR NAMING OPPORTUNITIES:

The Regents were provided a proposed policy for the naming of facilities and programs as a way to honor distinguished alumni, donors, and friends of Amarillo College in their board materials for review.

Mr. White provided an overview of this policy. He worked with Kathy Dowdy of the AC Foundation and looked at naming policies at other institutions. The draft presented at this board meeting is for discussion purposes. He would like to have something in place by August in order to proceed with some opportunities that are forthcoming. For now, this document will serve as policy and procedure but will later become a policy in the Board Policy Manual as work on that document is completed. The President of the college may then set the procedures. Within the current draft these naming opportunities are not tied to a certain dollar amount. The naming may be for programs and buildings and may be honorific in nature. The draft addresses permanence, pledges, logos, etc. Mr. White is requesting the Board to determine the level of involvement they would want to have in naming right approvals, but requests sufficient authority so as to be able to efficiently communicate with potential donors. The Board discussed questions regarding permanence, retroactive naming, right of refusing a request, and Board approval based on amount of gift or the naming of a building. Mr. White will rework the policy. This will be an action item at the August Board meeting.

ADDITIONAL FACULTY PROMOTION IN RANK RECOMMENDATION APPROVED:

Dr. Vess reviewed an additional faculty recommendation for promotion and stated her approval of this recommendation effective September 1, 2016.

C. Wade Osen Emergency Medical Services
Professions

Mr. Barrett moved, seconded by Dr. Nossaman, to approve this recommendation for rank and promotion. The motion carried unanimously.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL NO. 1320 – RE-ROOFING PROJECT, PHASE III, FOR AMARILLO COLLEGE, AMARILLO, TEXAS APPROVED:

Mr. Cotgreave reviewed Proposal No. 1320 which is for Phase III of the roofing repairs due to hail damage. This will complete these repairs, and he is recommending three companies be approved for the repair work which will shorten the timeframe for completion. He clarified the breakdown of the companies involved and the buildings on which they will be working. A tabulation of the proposals received is attached at page 218.

Ms. Carlisle moved, seconded by Dr. Proffer, to approve RFP 1320. The motion carried unanimously.

SIGNATURE AUTHORITY RESOLUTION APPROVED:

The Regents were provided a resolution authorizing banking and signature authority for Steven Smith, Vice President of Business Affairs, and Tiffani Crosley, Director of Accounting.

Dr. Proffer moved, seconded by Mr. Miller, to approve this resolution. The motion carried unanimously. Chair, Ms. Fortunato, signed the resolution which is attached at page 219.

INVESTMENT REPORT APPROVED:

Mr. Smith provided the Regents a quarterly memo reflecting AC's compliance with the investment policy and the Public Funds Investment Act. He then reviewed the Investment report which had been provided in the Board materials. Assets were at \$42M as of February 29, 2016 and at \$34.8 May 31, 2016. This is a larger drop than normal due to the retirement incentives and A&I expenditures. There has been a higher yield to maturity during this period. Mr. Smith related that 67% is held in CD's at Amarillo National Bank using a layered strategy and 33% is in liquid cash or assets.

Mr. Miller moved, seconded by Dr. Nossaman, to approve the Investment Report. The motion carried unanimously.

CONSIDERATION OF AUTHORIZATION TO REFINANCE ALL CALLABLE SERIES 2008 AND 2009 GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS APPROVED:

Mr. Smith introduced Mr. Jason Hughes with First Southwest Asset Management Company who presented a proposal asking for authority to refinance a portion of AC's general bonds. He recapped the refunded portion of Series 2008 bonds in 2015 which saved \$981,020 and cut the interest rate in half without extending the term. The Board may pre-approve the sale of the remaining 2008 bonds and callable 2009 bonds based on certain parameters. All parameters would have to be met before the sale could occur, and if approved, must take place within the next six months. Mr. Hughes anticipates a sale by the end of July and the projected savings to be \$1.5M.

Ms. Carlisle moved, seconded by Mr. Miller, to approve refinancing of all callable Series 2008 and 2009 General Obligation Bonds. The motion carried unanimously.

FINANCIAL REPORT APPROVED:

The financial statements as of May 31, 2016 are attached at pages 220-229.

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Mr. Smith noted that as of May 31, 2016 we have received \$26M in state and local tax revenue which is in line with projections at 78%. He noted that tuition and fees are slightly ahead and KACV is slightly behind. Other income is on track at \$47.6M or 77%. Expenses are at \$42M, or 68%, which is lower than normal indicating faculty and staff are working towards keeping spending down. The Auxiliary accounts are at \$890,000. Mr. Miller questioned the loss of \$696 in the Moore County vending line. Ms. Renee Vincent stated that this spending fund balance looks negative but is actually use of rollover money. Mr. Smith will clarify. The Restricted account is down due to some additional usage of that account. Cash and Investments are at \$41.9M.

Mr. Miller moved, seconded by Ms. Carlisle, to accept the May 31, 2016 financial report. The motion carried unanimously.
