STATUS UPDATE

The Status Update Meeting began at 5:55 p.m.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION REPORT

Ms. Logan Nelson, Student Government Association President, introduced herself. She graduated from Bushland High School, is a General Studies major at AC, and plans to study Political Science at WTAMU. She then plans to go to law school. She noted that K-Love, the poet, will be coming on September 8. The theme for Fall Fest is "Beach Bash". The SGA's goals this year include fostering a welcoming environment, continuously recruiting for SGA, and dominating at the State Convention.

Finance Committee (AC Investment, Potential Lease & Sales Opportunities, East Property Family Housing) – report by Barrett, Henke, Proffer, Mize No report.

AC Foundation – report by Woodburn, Henke, Barrett

At the last meeting, Mr. White and Dr. Lowery-Hart presented the "You Should Know" information being shown to various community groups during a lunch in Dr. Lowery-Hart's office. The only business discussed was the upcoming Annual Meeting on September 15 and the Celebrate Education event to be held on October 13. Shanna Peeples is this year's Distinguished Alumna and will speak. More information on this will be presented at the next meeting of the Board of Regents.

Amarillo Museum of Art (AMoA) – report by Fortunato No report.

Panhandle PBS – report by Nossaman, Miller

Mr. Miller reported that at the last committee meeting they heard from Ms. Jordan Herrera about the Advocacy and Resource Center and the needs they are meeting there. Ms. Karen Welch gave information on "Live Here" and "Yellow City Sounds." In October and November, they will provide election information. On November 16, 2016, Matt Morgan will receive a philanthropy award.

Standing Policies & Procedures Committee – report by Carlisle, Fortunato, Woodburn

Russell noted that Ms. Lyndy Forrester and Mr. White have spent numerous hours going through the Policies and Procedures manual. They have included Faculty Senate in parts of the discussions and will have something to present to the Board at a later date.

Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone (TIRZ) – report by Woodburn

Dr. Woodburn reported they have reviewed the 2016-2017 budget, looked at an application from the Mays Foundation to do landscaping around 10th and Tyler, and discussed the Multi-Purpose Event Center and parking garage.

Amarillo Foundation for Education and Business - report by Proffer, Mize, Carlisle

Dr. Proffer reported that they have discussed a presentation at a future Board meeting.

Legislative Affairs Committee – Carlisle, Miller, Nossaman

Ms. Carlisle noted that they have not met but will do so. Kel Seliger has held town hall meetings. She attended one in Clarendon and had breakfast with Robert Riza, Clarendon Community College president, Jud Hicks, Frank Phillips College President, and Jacob Fraire from TACC. Rep. Ken King was at the Town Hall that followed. The allotment for K-12 increase was addressed but Community Colleges were not. On October 4, the Texas Tribune will be hosting a Conversation with Reps. Four Price & John Smithee at the Amarillo Downtown Campus.

Nominating Committee – Nossaman, Proffer, Barrett

No report.

BOARD COMMITTEES

Chairman Fortunato provided a list of current committee assignments brought forward from last year. Mr. Kitten and Mr. Running should be added to some committees. She asked that they let her know their preferences and asked the other Regents to let her know if they wanted a change. Mr. Barrett has been added to the Legislative Affairs Committee.

COMMUNICATION AND MARKETING DISCUSSION

Chris Hays, Interim Vice President of Communications and Marketing and Director of Panhandle PBS introduced himself to the Board. He noted that the Board of Regents are on file as their governance board and Dr. Nossaman and Mr. Miller are members of their advisory board. He encouraged the Regents to be a part of the station and to reach out to them. He noted the following facts about the station.

- Licensed by the FCC
- A member station, paying dues to PBS which mostly go toward programming
- Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB) provides government funding and lobbying efforts.
 They have a formula which determines what stations need and amounts may vary from year
 to year. AC is considered a small, rural station which allows for more funding that a medium
 station would receive.
- Funded by Amarillo College, in-kind donations, fundraising, underwriting on programming, sponsorships, and memberships
- Several investment funds are used for various needs for equipment and operations. Mr. Hays
 provided a list and description of these to the Board. He noted that the last use of these funds
 was a year ago to upgrade servers and the expenditure was approved by the Board.

Panhandle PBS has been reorganized over the past year. Some staff are in new positions with new job descriptions and/or titles and some replacement positions have new people. Under the reorganization, there is a weekly presence on air with our own shows. The presence on social media has increased from 2,000-3,000/week to 30,000-40,000/week. The reach of Facebook has doubled and content is uploaded every day. In the last few months more projects telling our own story have been produced both internally and for the community. This allows the station to raise additional funds and be more active. Redevelopment of the web site to better aid students market AC is in process.

A Director of Communications and Marketing will be hired who will market and then measure the effects of campaigns. This is not a new position. Also looking for an Account Executive who will be able to raise funds.

Mr. Mize commended the work that is being done by Communications and Marketing.

FINANCIALS

Mr. Smith reviewed his PowerPoint presentation which was provided to the Board and attached to the agenda for this meeting. He noted that the budget had been updated from the June budget workshop. The revenue numbers are now real numbers, not projected. Taxes and tuition and fees are expected to be up 2.5-3% rather than down 2% as previously expected. Reserve funds will take care of Alterations and Improvements expenses previously budgeted but paid in this upcoming year.

Mr. Smith also explained that the business office has been proactive to prepare for the possibility that the State could request additional funds back in the future. Any additional funds would roll over into reserve that would be available if requested.

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Revenue numbers are conservative. Budget includes a 3% raise. Some positions have been added back for the Physical Plant as they lost a large percentage of staff to the retirement incentive. Some funds have been added for IT and to the Police department for scanners. Additional funds were added to the accounts of the Vice Presidents to spend with their teams and \$400,000 was provided to Mr. Cotgreave for A&I with a request to itemize the needs. Employee benefits have been overbudgeted in the past and are more accurately listed in the new budget.

Mr. Smith discussed the tax rate history and reiterated that it has not changed. The effective tax rate shows a reduction due to exemptions and special allowances. However, there is an increase in total dollars due to increased valuation.

ENROLLMENT UPDATE

Mr. Austin reported that enrollment is up 2.59% to 9746 student on day 8 and students continue to enroll for the 2nd 8-week sections. Dual credit registrations took place today at Amarillo and Dumas high schools. Across the state, 56% of colleges are down in enrollments.

NO EXCUSES 2020

Dr. Lowery-Hart noted that AC has received a commendation from the US Department of Education for intentional alignment between our social services program and our developmental education department. Dr. Tamara Clunis, Dean of Academic Success, was recommended for this award by a THECB program officer. AC will participate in a national conversation via webinar, lead two community of practice national conversations, and be recognized by the US Department of Education in September in Washington, DC. The program officer for the US Department of Education made special note of the focused vision of our president and his commitment to overcoming poverty barriers for students. AC is only one of four institutions receiving this commendation. AC will highlight this prestigious commendation in a future press conference.

The Regents have been invited to this semester's General Assembly on September 9 and are encouraged to sit at separate tables with faculty and staff.

Representatives from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board will be at General Assembly to announce that AC is receiving a \$904,000 grant award as an innovation leader in connecting our developmental education program with workforce careers in the Texas Panhandle.

PUBLIC HEARING ON THE BUDGET FOR 2016-2017 FISCAL YEAR:

At this time any person and/or persons wishing to come before the Board of Regents regarding the 2016-2017 Budget for Amarillo College in the Amarillo Junior College District is given the opportunity to be heard. A final summary of the proposed budget for 2016-2017 is attached at pages 10 through 17.

Chairman Fortunato asked for any questions from Board or public. There were none.

BUDGET FOR 2016-2017 FISCAL YEAR APPROVED AND ADOPTED:

The proposed budget is attached at pages 250 to 257.

It was recommended to adopt the budget by passing the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the legal requirements of the laws of the State of Texas and the regulations of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board regarding this document have been met;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the said proposed budget for the 2016-2017 fiscal year is hereby designated as the official budget for Amarillo College in the Amarillo Junior College District for the 2016-2017 fiscal year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Ms. Michele Fortunato, Chair of the Board of Regents of the Amarillo Junior College District, be directed to file copies of this official budget with the county clerks of Potter and Randall counties of Texas, and with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board for distribution to the Governor's Budget and Planning Office, the Legislative Budget Board, and the Legislative Reference Library.

Dr. Nossaman moved, seconded by Dr. Woodburn, to approve and adopt the 2016-2017 budget. The motion carried unanimously.

TAX RATE FOR 2016 APPROVED:

In accordance with the provisions of Section 26.04 of the Texas Property Tax Code, the Randall County Tax Assessor/Collector published the legal notice stating that the effective tax rate for 2016 for the Amarillo Junior College District is \$0.20096 per \$100 of assessed value.

Adoption of the following resolution will set the 2016 Tax Rate at \$0.20750 for operations.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Chair of the Board of Regents of the Amarillo Junior College District has caused to be formulated and adopted a budget for Amarillo College in the Amarillo Junior College District for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 2016, and ending August 31, 2017, the tax year 2016, now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. An ad valorem tax of, and at the rate of four and eighty-one thousandths cents (\$.04081) on the one-hundred dollar (\$100) value thereof, estimated in lawful currency of the United States of America, be levied to pay interest on and provide a sinking fund for Amarillo College in the Amarillo Junior College District for bonds issued June 15, 2008, June 15, 2009, June 15, 2010, May 15, 2012, and July 2, 2015.
- 2. An ad valorem tax of, and at the rate of sixteen and six hundred sixty-nine thousandths cents (\$0.1669) on the one-hundred dollar (\$100) value thereof, estimated in lawful currency of the United States of America, be levied to pay for the support and maintenance of Amarillo College in the Amarillo Junior College District for the fiscal year 2016-2017, the tax year 2016.

BE IT ORDERED by the Board of Regents of the Amarillo Junior College District that there is hereby levied for the tax year 2016 on all real property situated in, and all business personal property owned within the limits of said district on the first day of January 2016 same being the current year, except so much thereof as may be exempt by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, or of the United States of America, a total of twenty and seven hundred fifty thousandths cents (\$0.20750) on the one-hundred dollar (\$100) value thereof, estimated in lawful currency of the United States of America for support and maintenance, payment of current interest, and a sinking fund for the retirement of bonds of Amarillo College in the Amarillo Junior College District for the fiscal year 2016-2017. "THIS TAX RATE WILL RAISE MORE TAXES FOR MAINTENANCE AND OPERATIONS THAN LAST YEAR'S TAX RATE." "THE TAX RATE WILL EFFECTIVELY BE RAISED BY 5.14% AND WILL RAISE TAXES FOR MAINTENANCE AND OPERATIONS ON A \$100,000 HOME BY APPROXIMATELY \$8.16."

Information regarding the tax rate increase is attached at page 258.

Mr. Mize moved, seconded by Mr. Henke, to approve the tax rate. The motion carried unanimously.

It was noted for the record that the tax rate has not been increased for three years.

PURCHASE OF CUSTODIAL SUPPLIES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2016-2017 APPROVED:

Requesting approval to purchase custodial supplies for the 2016-2017 Budget Year. Purchases will be made through the Buy Board Contract originally approved by a Board resolution on January 27, 2003.

Estimated price of supplies is \$120,000.00.

Funds are available in the 2017 Custodial Budget.

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Mr. Cotgreave explained that these are the normal supplies purchased throughout the year but only approved by the Board once a year. Board approval is required because the purchase is over \$50,000. This includes paper goods and cleaning supplies and also includes Moore County and Hereford Campuses.

Ms. Carlisle moved, seconded by Dr. Proffer, to approve the purchase of custodial supplies for fiscal year 2016-2017. The motion carried unanimously.

FINANCIAL REPORT APPROVED:

The financial statements as of July 31, 2016 are attached at pages 259 - 268.

Mr. Smith reported these numbers through July of 2016.

- Revenue \$53,956.161
- Expenses \$51,471,879
- Surplus of \$2.84M

With one month left in this fiscal year, he expects to end with a surplus of approximately \$2M which will go into the reserve account. All open purchase orders are currently being reviewed before approval. Procurement cards may not be used after the beginning of August due to the short time frame of three weeks required by the auditors to close out the books. Mr. Smith reviewed the reserve analysis and noted that in the future the college would take a pay-as-you-go approach and reserves willbe used differently.

Mr. Miller moved, seconded by Mr. Barrett, to accept the July 31, 2016 financial report. The motion carried unanimously.

CLOSED MEETING:

At 7:30 p.m., Ms. Fortunato announced there would be a closed meeting in order that the Board might discuss personnel and meet with legal counsel pursuant to <u>Texas Government Code</u>, Sections 551.074 and 551.071. Michael Kitten, Mike Running and Mark White were invited to attend the closed meeting, their attendance being deemed necessary.

At 8:30 p.m., Ms. Fortunato called the Amarillo College Board of Regents meeting back into open session. No action was taken during the closed meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:30 p.m.
