Honors College Proposal

What if we could do more to develop the abilities and potential of high achieving, motivated students at Amarillo College? We propose seeking a donor to help Amarillo College create a named Honors College that will prepare our students to excel, become leaders and improve life in their communities.

Creating the Honors College will increase students' opportunities for scholarship, leadership and service. As members of an Honors College, AC students will be able to gain recognition at the local, state, regional and national levels. Establishing an AC Honors College will also boost graduates' opportunities to transfer directly into Honors colleges at universities.

Students will only be admitted to the Honors College by application and a limited number of students will be accepted each year. We propose beginning the program by admitting 50, then expanding to 75 and 100 in the following two years.

Students who are admitted to the Honors College will receive

- An "Honors College" designation on transcript and diploma
- Smaller classes with increased student engagement and interactivity and exceptional faculty
- The opportunity to participate in undergraduate research, cultural enrichment and service learning opportunities
- Payment of Phi Theta Kappa (the national community college honor society) dues (Approximately \$100 per student.)
- Articulation and scholarship agreements with universities
- Invitations to special Honors events and activities
- Special recognition at graduation
- The opportunity to apply for national Honors awards and grants and to participate in and present at national and regional Honors conferences
- The chance to participate in a paid two-day cultural, technology or health care excursion in the DFW metroplex.
- Mentoring from community leaders in the students' areas of study.
- Leadership training workshops
- Weeklong Honors Expo featuring speakers and presentations relating to the students' areas of research and study.

Proposed Honors College admission criteria...

In order to be admitted to the Honors College, candidates will complete a written application and essay and submit two recommendations, transcripts and test scores. Successful candidates will have:

- A minimum of 90% high school GPA or 3.0 college GPA
- College-level placement on the TSI or a combined SAT score of 1100 (math, critical reading) or a composite ACT score of 26

Demonstrated involvement in extra-curricular activities

Earning Honors/Scholars designations on transcripts...

In order to earn the Honors College designation on the transcript, a student must

- Be admitted to the Honors College
- Maintain a GPA of 3.0 or above
- Complete at least four Honors classes--designated with an 00H or by Honors contract

Current Honors & Scholars offerings...

Currently, AC offers the Presidential Scholars Program, which is similar to the proposed Honors College but serves a much smaller number of students and has an overseas travel component.. The Scholars Program is an application-only learning community of 15 high-achieving recent high school graduates. The Presidential Scholars Program has been highly successful at serving exceptional students and we believe that this program must continue at AC. Unfortunately, the Scholars Program provides enriched opportunities for a very small number of students and numerous applicants must be turned away. Because the defining aspect of the Scholars program is the paid global educational travel program, expanding the number of Scholars admitted is cost-prohibitive. We accept 15 new Scholars each year and serve up to 30 at a time. The existing Presidential Scholars Program would continue as is and would be a subset of the Honors College if this proposal becomes a reality. So, all Presidential Scholars would be members of the Honors College, but all members of the Honors College would not be Presidential Scholars.

In order to graduate as a Presidential Scholar, students must

- Be admitted to the Scholars Program
- Maintain a GPA of 3.5 or above
- Complete at least four honors classes--designated with an 00H or by honors contract
- Complete two semesters of Scholars Seminar (EDUC-1100-PSH and HONR 1011-PSH)
- Complete a significant research project

AC currently also offers designated honors class sections a semester. Honors sections are smaller, more interactive sections of high enrollment classes. Students can self-enroll in honors sections if they have at least a 3.0 GPA or a 90% average directly out of high school. These students receive no scholarships incentives and, while each class is labeled with an "H" on the transcript, they receive no official "Honors" designation when they graduate. Currently we offer about 10 sections of Honors classes in general education core areas each semester. These classes serve about 200 students each semester. Honors courses are usually limited to classes with multiple sections.

We also offer the Honors by contract option, which allows students to choose courses not classified as honors sections and earn an honors section credit. The contract is an agreement between the student and the professor and approved by the Honors co-coordinator. The Honors contract will detail an enhanced aspect of the class, such as a special project that will enrich the students' experience and learning beyond the standard scope of the course.

Members of the proposed Honors College, (including those in the Presidential Scholars Program), would be required to complete at least four honors designated sections.

Building on our experience...

As our community's college, AC should strive to serve all types of students—from helping the underprepared students to prepare... to helping the successful students to excel. AC's success with the Presidential Scholars Program and the standard Honors classes has proven that students are interested in and qualified for these opportunities. The creation of an Honors College will provide important benefits for AC students and our community as a whole.

Projected Honors College annual costs

- Annual cultural, technology or health care DFW metroplex excursions: \$20,000 for up to 60 students a year
- Honors Expo: An annual week of speakers and presentations (includes food, printing, speaker's fees, travel and speaker lodging) \$10,000
- National Collegiate Honors Council Institutional Membership and Annual Conference: Allows students to qualify for national grants for innovative Honors college projects and research funding, conference participation, professional development for faculty and leaders, national awards for students and faculty and program reviews. Includes registration and travel costs for up to three students per year to attend and potentially present at National Conference \$6,350
- Great Plains Honors Council Membership and Conference: Allows students to attend and present at annual conference, compete for scholarships and awards. Annual registration and travel costs for 3-5 students and 1-3 faculty members \$5,050
- Annual professional development grants for Honors faculty: allows qualified faculty to apply to attend workshops, conferences or training to enhance their teaching and explore high impact Honors practices: \$2,000

- Phi Theta Kappa (national community college honors society) dues for all Honors College members: \$1,000 annually
- Student Leadership Retreat Fee Scholarship for all members: up to \$400 annually (maximum award is \$20 per student twice a year but not all will be able to attend retreats)
- Special Honors College cords for graduation: \$200
- Supplies and promotions \$5,000

Projected annual budget \$50,000

Please note that this \$50,000 annual budget does not include funding for the Presidential Scholars Program or Honors/Scholars staffing. Currently Honors/Scholars is staffed by cocoordinators, Lesley Ingham and Jill Gibson and part-time assistant Donna Salter. Ingham and Salter's salaries come from the Honors budget and Gibson receives six hours release time for her co-coordinator duties. We believe this existing staff is sufficient for managing the proposed Honors College.

Five possible key components to consider:

1. First and foremost, more stringent guidelines as to acceptance into the Honors Program need to be in place. High school GPAs that have no consideration of non-AP courses, etc. are misleading. The referenced handbook in your email indicates the below. I much appreciate the idea of a submitted essay. I currently have five honors students. Two are making an A; one is making a C; and the other two are, at best, D writers. This is not an exception but the norm. 'Uniform Standards

The following items are often used to set uniform standards for entrance into the program and the courses:

- Minimum cumulative GPA;
- SAT or ACT score—this criteria is usually expressed as a total number and as a minimum score on particular sections of the test.

 Programs often consider what the standard is in the area to define this criterion fairly;
- An essay offering proof of superior writing ability;
- Evidence of special competency or creativity, such as projects or a portfolio;
- Instructor recommendation(s);
- Signs of especially strong student motivation, perhaps determined through interviews, written pro
- 2. Improved on-campus marketing.
- 3. Clarity for students as to what being an "honors student" should indicate, does demand, and how it will be of benefit. (Two of my honors' students didn't know they were enrolled as such—this happens frequently.)
- 4. Clarity as to the relationship between Honors students and Presidential Scholars for professors as well as students.
- 5. An Honors Students Club allowing such students to recognize each other and support each other might be a consideration.

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- Write a list of what you believe are five key components of a successful honors program/honors college:
- 1. Program is widely advertised and designed to add value to the student academic experience
- 2. Honors-specific tracks built into the Colleague student planning module
- 3. Co-curricular programming that is specific to honors students

- 5. AA in General Studies degree plan that is specifically designed for honors students
