Panhandle Geriatric Education Program- Karen Russell	<ul> <li>Ms. Russell reported on the status of the Geriatric Education Program. The grant works with Level IV students by setting up Geriatric Health Fairs during the semester. For the fall 2006 semester, 3 fairs were conducted. The first fair was conducted at the Amarillo Tri-State Fair Senior Citizen's Day Health Fair and Program 476 adults attended. The next fair was the Park Central Retirement Community with 76 adults attending. The last fair was held in Booker Texas at the Lipscomb County Health &amp; Safety Fair seeing a total of 43 adults. The total number of adults seen for the fall 2006 semester was 595.</li> <li>Since January of 2002, 41 fairs have been conducted. The total attending the fairs was 3,889 with 411 nursing students working with the fair.</li> <li>The Principles of Eldercare will be offered on-line again in the spring. The course will also be offered in-class during March and April.</li> </ul>

The completion rate is based on the number of full time students who complete the nursing curriculum within a two-year period. The persistence rate is the number of students who persist in these programs after two years. CPR is the combined completion and persistence rates.</li> <li>The THECB also formed a task force to increase RN graduates in Texas to collect survey data from nursing programs and analysis surveys results.</li> <li>The Executive summary gave the following findings: Key findings were completion and persistence rates, survey results and trends. They recommended faculty strategies, student strategies and program administration strategies.</li> </ul>
