

## Youth in Crisis: Planting Seeds of Resilience



LaMarr Darnell Shields is a powerhouse whose advocacy for youth, and those who work with them, is known nationwide. His passion and message of successful living stimulate the minds, hearts and actions of men, women and youth to help them

cope with adversity and create success in their personal, professional, and spiritual lives.

This bilingual activist, author, educator, public speaker, social entrepreneur and Master Teacher, is the co-founder and President Emeritus of the Urban Leadership Institute (ULI). During his twelve-year tenure at ULI, LaMarr created the Paul Robeson Academic International School of Excellence (PRAISE), in collaboration with The Johns Hopkins School of Education, that helps African-American males become competitive applicants to four-year colleges/universities. He also wrote a variety of innovative educational curricula, namely Dare to Be Queen, Hands Off: Strategies to Combat Youth Violence, and Rhyme and Reason: A Hip Hop Tool for the Classroom, that are currently being used by educators, school systems and churches nationwide. LaMarr is a dynamic speaker and has shared his unique approach to reaching today's youth across the United States.

LaMarr has taught at Baltimore City College, the third oldest high school in the country, lived in Latin America, spoken at the Pentagon, the White House, written several articles and books, volunteered with AmeriCorps, served as a core member of Teach for America, and hosted a teen television show.

While his accomplishments are commendable, it is important to note that, due to his poor academic performance and mischievous behavior in school, LaMarr was expelled from a prestigious Catholic High School in Chicago in the 11th grade. After applying to dozens of schools and receiving numerous rejections, he was fortunate to be accepted into another high school where he became an honor roll student. He went on to become a distinguished graduate at Grambling State University and La Universidad de Coahuila in Mexico, where he majored in Political Science and Spanish. After acquiring his undergraduate degree, he went on to earn a Master's Degree in Education from Loyola College of Maryland.

Currently, LaMarr is the Co-founder and Senior Director of Education and Innovation at The Cambio Group. The organization, which means "Change" in Spanish, takes an innovative approach to cultivating, customizing and advancing the mission, short and long-term goals of clients through education, arts and advocacy.

On any given night, there are literally thousands of youth roaming the streets, couch surfing, sleeping in their cars, feeling neglected, being physically and emotionally abused, and taking extreme risks to survive.

**Youth in Crisis** will focus on the application of resiliency concepts and the development of protective factors at a community level and directly with children and youth. LaMarr has designed this interactive presentation to help youth service providers explore concepts associated with resilience, and develop a plan for implementing strengthsbased activities.

Additionally, a range of issues to assist individuals with managing stressful situations, abuse, and neglect, developing coping skills, and making decisions and setting goals will be explored. A framework for the development of lifelong learning skills associated with living a more balanced life will be provided. All will be presented as a series of modules, each containing a number of activity options.

Through a series of misfortunes, LaMarr demonstrates the core concepts of resiliency, defines key terms, and addresses strategies for becoming stronger. Whether a seasoned veteran or a novice, you will walk away with a new perspective on effectively working with those in crisis.

# Dr. Regina Lewis

### Bridges Out of Poverty: Strategies for Professionals & Communities



With 15 years of experience in leadership development, **Dr. Regina Lewis** has served diverse clientele – from executives to scholars, government agencies, educational institutions, and nonprofits. Through her travels, Regina has been immersed in many cultures, both

nationally and internationally; her work has taken her to Asia, the Middle East, Europe, and across the United States.

Regina began her extensive work in the area of families and individuals in need as a team member of counselors at the Women's Resource Agency and as the board chair for Pikes Peak Community Action Agency. Regina currently sits on the executive Metro YMCA board of Colorado Springs and Cheyenne Mountain Civic Solutions (CMCS).

At Pikes Peak Community College, Dr. Lewis is the chair of the Communications Department; assistant dean of communications, humanities and technical studies; and director of the Women's Forum. She holds a doctorate in educational leadership, research, and policy; a master's degree in communication; and two bachelor's degrees, one in communication and another in psychology, all from the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs. She has been published in books, journals, and higher educational textbooks. She is certified in Myers Briggs, Workplace Big 5, Firo Business, and Emotional Intelligence. In **Bridges Out of Poverty**, participants will create a mental model of poverty, review poverty research, examine a theory of change, and analyze poverty through the prism of the hidden rules of class, resources, family structure, and language. The seminar puts into words what many veteran professionals and community members have experienced. Throughout the workshop, participants will receive specific strategies for improving outcomes for people living in poverty, but the focus of the workshop is to provide a broad overview of concepts and is designed for audiences of employers, community organizations, law enforcement, counselors, educators, healthcare, and social service providers.

If you are looking to counter poverty in your community or its impact on people and businesses, explore the innovative concepts and training found in this workshop. It will help your whole community build sustainable success and represents a powerful tool for change.
