COGNITIVE INTERVIEW AND CONFRONTATIONAL INTERROGATION

COURSE DESCRIPTION ***

The first half of this course will focus on interviewing the victim and witness. There will be training and discussion on Cognitive, Free Format and Free Narrative style interviews. There will be demonstrations and role play using the student body. Principles will be applied to adult and children witnesses and victims. Topics will be covered from rapport building to clarifying, echoing and documenting the interview.

The second half of class will be on Interrogation. Topics will cover Personal History Forms, Elimination Questions Form, Rapport Building, Theme Building, Negative Alternatives, Clarifying and Expanding the Confession, Handling and Stopping Denials and more. Students will be expected to participate in role play, demonstrations and discuss personal experiences related to interrogations.



INSTRUCTOR BIOGRAPHY

Phylip Peltier is now retired after more than 29 years of

law enforcement service. Mr. Peltier served as a criminal investigator for the Butte County District Attorney's Office in Oroville, California for three years. Prior to that, Peltier was an Investigator for the San Diego County District Attorney's Office for 14 years, and he served on the San Diego Police Department for 12 years. Much of this time in law enforcement was spent in the investigation of child abuse. During his tenure with the SDPD, Peltier developed the Immersion Burn Worksheet, now recommended and published by the United States Department of Justice and distributed to law enforcement agencies both nationally and internationally. Peltier has testified as an expert witness in suspicious burn injuries in criminal prosecutions. An instructor in the investigation of child abuse as well as suspicious burn injuries since 1981, Peltier received the Excellence in Instruction Award from the Robert Preslev Institute of Criminal Investigation for 1999-2000. In 2005, Peltier graduated from the P.O.S.T. Master Instructor Development Program. As his thesis for this program, he designed and now presents the "Advanced Child Physical Abuse Investigation" class, which is now part of the P.O.S.T. annual curriculum. Peltier has been training law enforcement and related personnel in the area of Interview and Interrogation since 1994. He presents this program nationally and internationally. Peltier continues to research the area of burn injuries and is currently teaching, consulting and investigating cases in the United States and many international locations.


