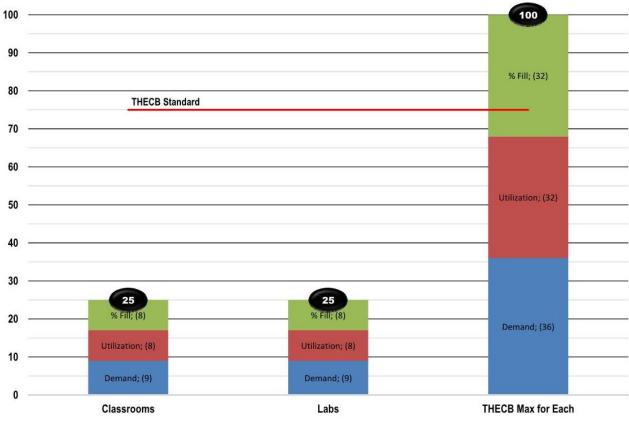


Size Categories

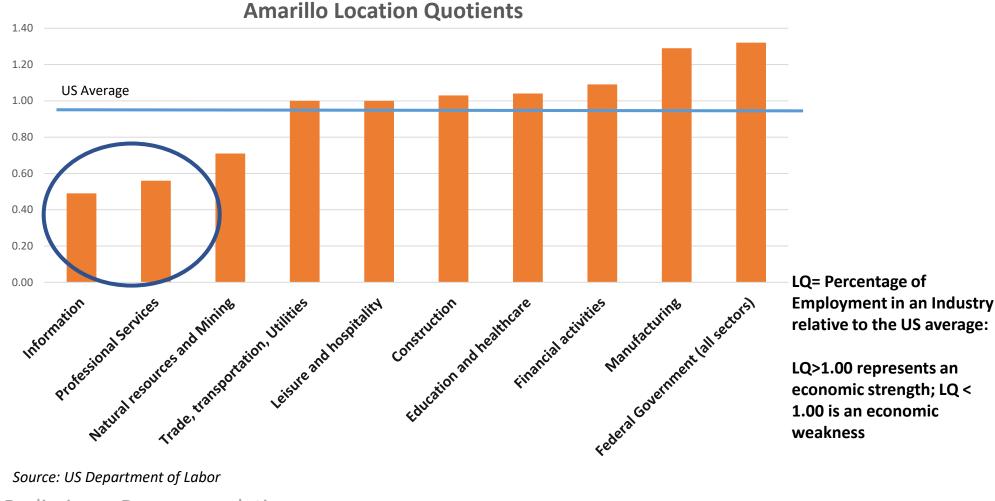

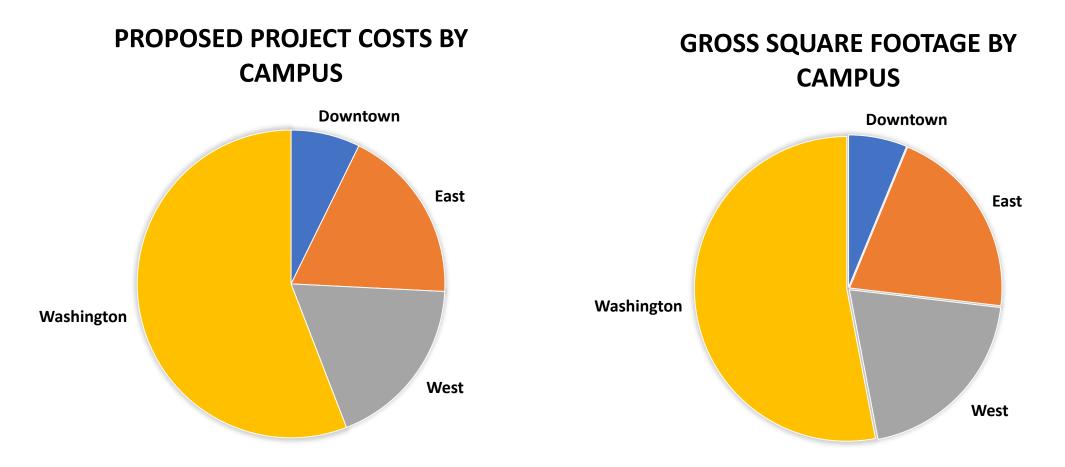

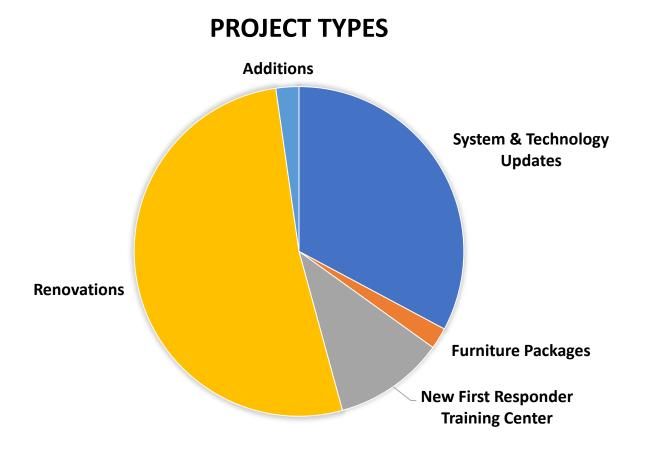
- ATTRACT unemployed and underemployed Houston residents and youth to middle-skill positions across the region—in part by raising awareness of and changing perceptions about these careers.

- **PLACE** and retain these workers in middle-skill jobs on career paths that reward those who continue to upgrade their skills and mentor those who need a little support.

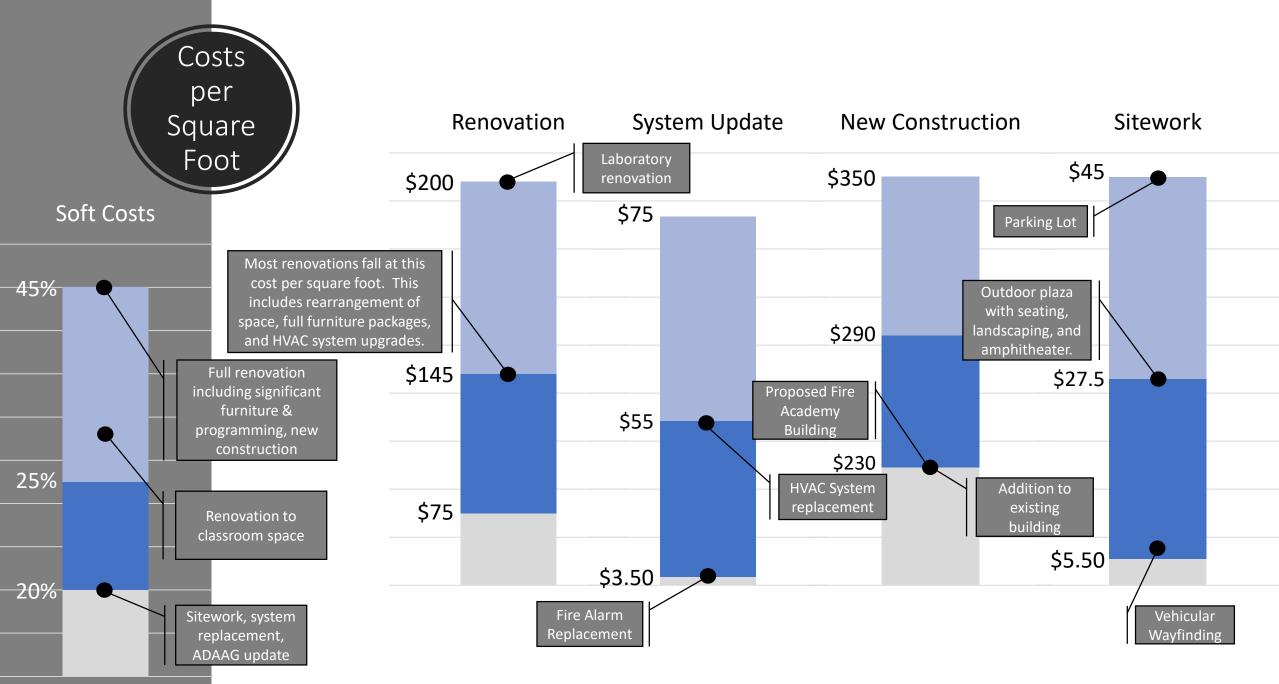
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Capital Outlay Plan Data

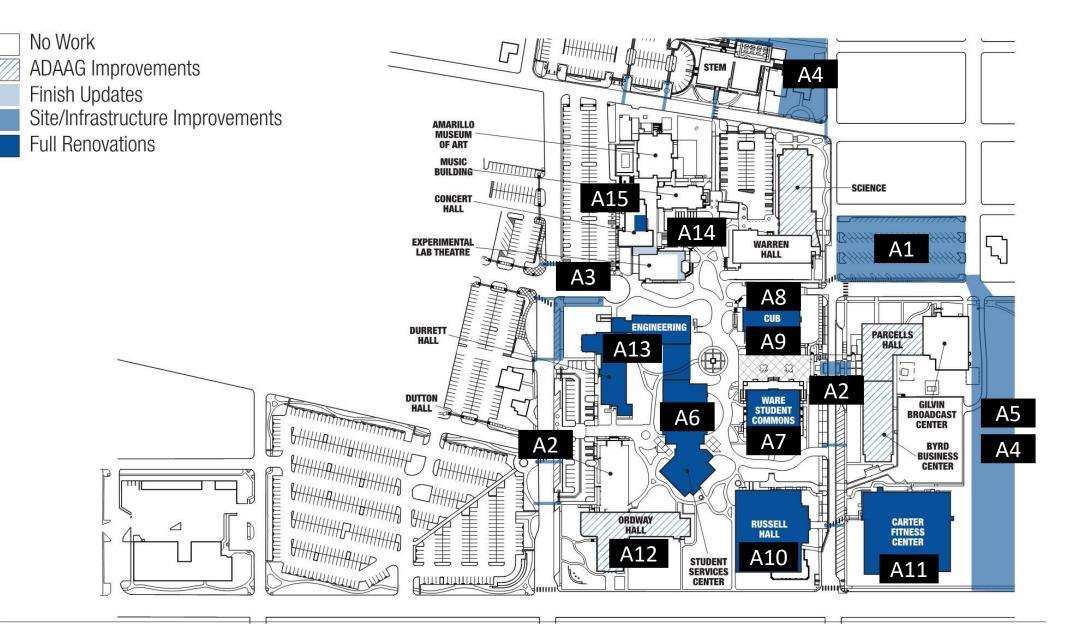


Existing Parking Analysis

- There is a deficit of 295 spaces on Washington St expected to have an effective supply factor of 85%. With the increase in enrollment 10 years from now, there will be a deficit of 455 spaces.
- Uneven distribution between north and south parking spots. 22% of total parking spots available are on the southern half of campus.
- Recommended improvements to Parking Lot 9 to alleviate congestion and improve safety for both drivers and pedestrians.
- Other concerns include blind corners, on-street maneuvering, tight streets, and neighborhood parking.
