Responsible Party	What to Do	When?
Student	Report accident/incident to clinical supervisor.	Immediately following accident/incident.
Clinical Supervisor	Notify Program Director or other designated program official.	Immediately following accident/incident.
Clinical Supervisor	In the event of an injury from a contaminated sharp, notify patient's physician and request HIV testing. A special, separate patient consent form for testing and release of test results must be obtained in order for testing to be performed. Patients must receive preand post-test counseling from the patient's medical provider (see individual medical facility guidelines to determine the appropriate individual). NOTE: If the patient refuses to grant consent, HIV testing can not and will not be performed. In this case, the contamination will be treated as if the patient is positive for HIV, and the appropriate protocol will be enacted.	Immediately following accident/incident.
Program Director or other designated program official	Contact injured student and fill out Student Injury Worksheet. Let student know that they may seek treatment, if necessary, from their personal	Immediately following notification of accident/incident.
Program Director or other designated program official	physician. Send a copy of the Student İnjury Worksheet to AC Police to be filed and keep a copy of Student Injury Worksheet for student file. If injury involves contaminated sharps, TDSHS Contaminated Sharps Injury Reporting Form must also be completed. One copy should remain with the student file.
