Program Goals/Program Learning Outcomes (PLOs)

Program Goal #1: Students will apply theatrical performance and production skills to create, to develop, and to present theatrical presentations.

- **PLO 1.1:** Students will demonstrate an understanding for and implement training of theatrical safety standards for not only themselves but of others.
- **PLO 1.2:** Students will develop and refine their acting tools, the voice and the body, for safer and more effective performances.
- **PLO 1.3:** Students will implement a variety of theoretical acting techniques for more effective performances.
- **PLO 1.4:** Students will develop and refine production design aesthetics.
- **PLO 1.5:** Students will effectively utilize appropriate technology and equipment for design, installation, and management of productions.

Program Goal #2: Students will demonstrate core knowledge in theatre terminology, vocabulary, hierarchy, and the art form's history.

- PLO 2.1: Students will possess a solid understanding of terminology and vocabulary used in theatre.
- **PLO 2.2:** Students will possess a solid understanding of the hierarchy structure of theatre arts in the modern era.
- **PLO 2.3:** Students will develop a rudimentary knowledge of theatrical history.
- **PLO 2.4:** Students will be aware of the multitude of career opportunities in the theatrical world and of those careers' responsibilities and requirements.

Program Goal #3: Students will apply discipline-specific research methodologies in crafting effective critical writing and/or oral/visual presentations about and for theatrical practice.

- **PLO 3.1:** Students will effectively articulate, through writing, an opinion of witnessed, live theatre focusing on its personal and community effectiveness.
- **PLO 3.2:** Students will develop written concept statements for production design that focuses on the student's understanding of the play's theme and the director's interpretation.
- **PLO 3.3:** Students will effectively present audition/monologue pieces and/or design/management portfolio pieces.
- **PLO 3.4:** Students will critically evaluate one another's papers/portfolios thoroughly and fairly reinforcing the theatre's collaborative environment.
- **PLO 3.5:** Students will be evaluated by faculty and staff once per semester via a jury session where the student will perform prepared monologue(s)/song(s) and/or present portfolio work developed over that semester's sixteen-week period. Student effectiveness in supporting the department's goals will also be discussed at this session. Students will be given feedback as to future directions and expectations that he/she can implement for the next semester or for transfer.
