Websites

- Amarillo College Career Planning and Placement Services—Find out how you can receive help identifying a career that is right for you and how this office can help you find employment.
- Career Guide to Industries (U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics)—Some topics listed on this site are "occupations in the industry, training and advancement, earnings, expected job prospects, working conditions, information about the job market in each state, and more."
- Hot Jobs in Texas—Descriptions of numerous health careers. This Web site resulted from a collaborative project involving several Texas governmental agencies.
- Occupational Outlook Handbook (OOH) Search Page—The Occupational Outlook Handbook
 published by the U.S. Department of Labor/Bureau of Labor Statistics is one of the best sources of
 career information. Enter an occupation into the search box to view an article. Sections include Nature
 of the Industry, Working Conditions, Employment, Occupations in the Industry, Training and

- O*Net Resource Center—The O*NET Web site describes O*NET as the "nation's primary source of occupational information. It contains large amounts of career information, and much of it is formatted in easy-to-read bullet statements."

AC Library Databases

You will be asked for your AC Online login to access the AC Library Databases. Watch for the dates on career articles to avoid outdated information.

- Academic Search Complete: This multi-subject database contains both scholarly and popular content
 on a wide variety of topics. Combine the search term *career* or the name of the career with terms like
 change, development, guidance, etc. Click the "Full Text" box to retrieve only complete articles and not
 just summaries (abstracts).
- Associates Programs Source: Geared towards two-year vocational and professional fields. Examples: Paralegal, fire protection, criminal justice, interior design, aviation, auto repair.
- Vocational and Career Collection is designed for vocational and technical libraries serving high schools, community colleges, trade institutions, and the general public. This collection provides complete articles for more than 350 trade and industry-related periodicals. Click the "Full Text" box to retrieve only complete articles and not just summaries (abstracts).
- Encyclopedia of Careers and Vocational Guidance: "The revised and expanded 15th Edition includes more than 40 new job articles, more than 100 new photographs, and thoroughly updated career information about more than 750 jobs in more than 90 industries. In addition, new information has been included to help job-seekers stay on the cutting edge and understand the important role of the Internet and online social networking in today's employment market."
